2.14 Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC

Since the proposal for fresh autonomous status was approved by the state government in April 2015, the major focus of IQAC during the academic year 2015-16 has been orientation

and preparation for autonomy. Towards this end a number of interactive sessions, seminars and a workshop were organised. Besides, the IQAC ensured the implementation of ERP, installation of Amrita-Virtual Interactive E-learning World (A-View), Promotion of entrepreneurial initiatives, renovation of the science laboratories, enhance student placements etc.

‘Dimensions- the Inter-Departmental Discussion Forum’ has gained momentum during the academic year.

Prior to the UGC Expert Committee visit for autonomy, a five member committee was constituted to conduct the academic and administrative audit of all departments on 19th and 20th of November 2015. The committee briefed the departments on their strengths and weaknesses and constructive suggestions were made for improving their performance during the exit meeting.

To improve the efficiency of the data management system, ERP was implemented.

It has chapters in New York, Chicago, Kuwait, Qatar and North India. Every year meetings of the alumnae association are held at college and departmental levels. At the end of the academic year all the outgoing students are enrolled as the members of the alumnae association. **Thirty four scholarships** for students, including the **Gold Medal for Best Outgoing Student**, have been instituted by our alumnae. The Chicago Chapter has instituted an annual **Best Alumna Award**, and there are other scholarships instituted by the alumnae of various departments and the chapters of the Association in different countries. The various departments conduct lectures by distinguished alumni for the benefit of students. At times well placed alumni are invited over to orient and motivate students towards higher study options, research and careers.

6.12 Activities and support from the Parent – Teacher Association

The noteworthy accomplishment of the PTA was the installation of the Solar Power Plant in September 2015. Besides their regular welfare schemes, PTA initiated the distribution of notebooks for the financially backward students.

6.13 Development programmes for support staff

The Staff Cooperative Society offers term deposit schemes, runs chits and extends loan facility to teaching and non teaching staff members, thus helping them in times of financial need. Besides, financial assistance is provided to the support staff when the need arises.

As part of the green, clean campus initiative, saplings were planted throughout the campus. An Eco-burn Plant was installed in the campus for effective waste management aiming at a sustainable environment. Solar power plant is used in the campus.

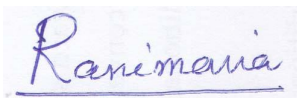

Analysis of Feedback

Feedbacks were collected from Alumnae, students and parents regarding the various activities and facilities of the college.

Summary of the feedback from Alumnae

The Alumnae really appreciated and congratulated the College in becoming an autonomous one. They also raised their concerns about the challenges ahead under autonomy. The Alumnae stressed the need for enhancing the English communication skills of the students. They also pointed out that efforts should be made to enhance the emotional quotient of the students as that poses one of the major challenges in modern times. They are happy with the extracurricular activities of the College. It was suggested to establish a strong linkage with the local community through various community development programmes. Some of the alumnae extended their service and support for the community outreach programmes. Another suggestion that came up from their feedback was that the alumnae meet has to be batch wise and the common meeting should be more effective if held once in 3 years or so.

Summary of the feedback from Parents

The Parent- Teacher Association is very active in the college with various developmental activities, financial support and constructive suggestions for improvement. They are highly satisfied with the mentoring and value education given to the students. They suggested the need for improving the communication skills of the students. They opined that the placement mechanism should be revamped and the College should attract more employers to the College so that the placements will get a good thrust. The PTA is very happy that the College has become autonomous and they emphasised the need for a more dynamic collaboration with industries.

Summary of feedback from students

Students are happy with the facilities in the College, but they want the campus to be a WiFi one. They rated high the mentoring system and are satisfied with the extracurricular activities of the college. They are highly satisfied with the internal examination and evaluation system. They would like to have a more ICT enabled instruction.

PEER LED COMMUNICATION SKILLS TRAINING

The **Peer Led Enrichment Programme in English Language Skills** for the second and third year students which started in 2014-15 under the leadership of the Department of English has been continued in the year 2015-16. Ninety advanced learners from all disciplines were selected and given intensive training in communication skills.
